#### RESIDENTIAL RENTAL ORDINANCE


The Village of South Holland has always had the desire to balance the interest of the owner occupied homes and the interests of the rental units, as well as maintain a healthy balance in housing. In order to do so, the Residential Rental Ordinance ensures that rental units are not concentrated in one area of the Village by limiting the number of rental units located on any given 2020 Census Block at 10 percent of the residences located in a Census Block. # AFTER NOTICING STRAY GARBAGE WHILE RUNNING, RETIREE DOES SOMETHING ABOUT IT

When Gerald Harris is passionate about something, he gives it 110%. It's true about several things that have been a big part of his life—coaching and umpiring baseball, running, horses. He has also put that same passion into helping keep South Holland looking good.

Harris had lived in South Holland at one time and then moved away, but he always knew he wanted to return. So when he turned 55, he moved into the Villas of South Holland townhouse community, which is designed for individuals age 55+. That was 13 years ago. He got involved with the grounds committee at the Villas and pitched in with beautification efforts. "I'd go around here and there and clean up and touch up," he says.



But he didn't stop in his own neighborhood. As a runner, he'd notice stray garbage on his route and make a mental note to get back there with a garbage bag and stick and pick it up. "It's like breadcrumbs," he says. "I just start and go to the next street and then the next street and then I find myself on Route 6. I feel like that's our front porch, so I want it to be clean."

The retiree considers it good exercise, and while he says he isn't out there as often as he used to be, it's something he wants to keep doing. "It's not a big deal to me," he says. "I just want to keep it clean."

Harris gives kudos to the village employees who work diligently on the town's appearance. "They do a great job," he says, but he wants to help where he can. "If you love your community, you do it," he says. "This is my village."

Regarding his other passions... he dedicated many years to Little League Baseball as a coach, manager, umpire and board member in Chicago. He even umpired in the semi-pro level. After that chapter ended, he became interested in horses and has owned four since then. His current horse, who is boarded in Dyer, has been with him for 20 years. He has been seen riding a horse in the annual Memorial Day Parade. In retirement, Harris became an avid runner, and in last fall's Fun Run 5K, he placed second in the 60-and-older age division.

"I'm a passionate person and when I get interested in something, I do it totally," he says. "I'm just a blessed person. Everything I ever needed has come to me. I've always had just enough. Not more than I needed, but always enough."

# A SOUTH HOLLAND COUPLE SINGS WITH THE STARS

Most married couples prefer to go by their mutual last name. But RAII and Whitney are no ordinary couple. Married in 2010, the pair use their performance names almost everywhere they go. RAII stands for Rhythm, Alternative, Instrumental, and Inspirational, and sounds similar to RAII's legal name. Together, RAII and Whitney—married couple—combine to make RAII & Whitney—accomplished musical duo.

Both of the current South Hollanders first started singing when they were in church choir growing up, and they met as part of a gospel group years ago. Now, RAII & Whitney have performed with the likes of Ed Sheeran, Alicia Keys, Estelle, and Common as supporting vocalists. They have also released several of their own albums.

"We definitely did not see being a supporting vocalist to the stars in our future," Whitney says, remembering how the two of them struck up a professional relationship with each other before they started dating. "But God had other plans, and I'm super grateful for that because being a supporting vocalist and touring internationally for a living definitely showed us the business side of it... and what it actually takes spiritually, mentally, and emotionally to have that type of lifestyle."

The pair has traveled the world twice over, using their voices to support the stars' voices. RAII & Whitney can



be spotted in videos of live performances with Ed Sheeran, Alicia Keys, and others online.

Faithful America's Got Talent fans will also recognize the duo from the 2016 season of the show, where they drew the words "I really, really like you two," from curmudgeonly judge Simon Cowell.

The couple has released three albums and multiple singles and EPs available on Spotify and similar platforms. Most recently, they released a Christmas album in 2020 and an album called "Car Tunes Tuesday Volume 1" before that. The "Car Tunes" album came out of a social media experiment where RAII & Whitney would post videos of themselves as they sat in a car together and performed short songs with simple messages on Tuesdays.

"We did it in a cool, fun way in the car," Whitney says. "And then it went viral and musicians started adding music to it on social media... people rapped to it, a lot of kids started to love it... teachers were saying they were playing it in their classrooms for encouragement."

RAII & Whitney are hoping to release their first children and family-oriented album later this summer. "That's been probably one of the most fun projects I personally have worked on," Whitney says.

RAII & Whitney do their vocal supporting work through their company His & Her Entertainment. They also perform for special events, and work with aspiring artists and musicians to help them achieve their dreams through training and development.

"Our [lessons] are vocal and performance because we realize there is a disconnect with learning the technique of the voice and performing live," Whitney says. "With our programs, we like to kind of bridge that gap."

RAII & Whitney are also certified as life and relationship coaches.

"When we do our vocal and performance programs, we don't just train the voice, we're also working on the person. It's huge for both of us not to just train another generation that is caught up in perfection trying to be the best singers," Whitney says.

The couple's heart for helping others stems from their Christian faith. Both RAII and Whitney grew up going to church, and their faith has formed them as they've moved through life—and moved through the music industry.

"People have a difficult time conceptualizing us in the industry being Christian, but they don't have that same challenge when they think about lawyers, or doctors, or any other field that is not overtly 'glorifying God' per se," RAII says. "We know that part of our purpose is to be that light, but then also to equip and train other artists to feel comfortable enough to be grounded in their Christianity and still be sent to these places where that might not be the main religion."

With faith as their focus, RAII & Whitney have found themselves right at home in South Holland, a village that first caught RAII's eye years ago when he saw a "Faith, Family, Future" sign while driving past. Although their first year living here was full of touring obligations and their second year was stifled by a global pandemic, the pair hopes to get more involved in the South Holland community in the years to come.

# THE PROBLEM RACTOR HOW GOD USES ADVERSITY FOR OUR GOOD

Over the last sixteen months, most people have experienced a harsh reality. This reality is that problems are real and ever present in our lives. Our problems may be financial, emotional, physical, spiritual or mental in nature. It makes us ponder the following: Why do I have problems? What are the reasons for the problems that I am facing? How are problems benefitting me?

We first must realize that life is a series of problems. We are either in a problem, coming out of a problem or going into a problem. This is what I call the "Problem Factor." As Christians, we have somehow embraced the idea that we would live on this earth problem-free because of our belief and spiritual walk with Jesus Christ. Well, I have news for you. Problems are Goddesigned. There is purpose for our problems.

"Dear brothers and sisters, when troubles of any kind come your way, consider it an opportunity for great joy. For you know that when your faith is tested, your endurance has a chance to grow. So let it grow, for when your endurance is fully developed, you will be perfect

and complete, needing nothing" James 1:2-4 (NLT). Problems are a test of our faith. They help develop patience, which means they help us become stronger in our faith as they expose our weak areas.

Our problems refine our faith. They cultivate and polish our spiritual walk so we develop our full potential in Christ. Many times, we seek to place blame on someone or something for the difficult issues in our lives. However, things we attribute to evil may well be the heat God applies that will result in purity and joy. For example, illness may be designed to bring fear to surface so God can build trust. Financial difficulty may raise materialism to the surface. Loneliness may raise idolatry to the surface. Relational difficulty may raise bitterness or unforgiveness to the surface. Disappointment at work may raise pride to the surface.

God brings our weaknesses to the surface so that ultimately we will be stronger, more like Him and more reflective. Problems also cause us to rely on God. If we never have problems that we are unable to handle on our own, we will never sense our need of

God. When we become overwhelmed with our problems, it is an indication of pride. We are trying to handle them all by ourselves instead of seeking the Lord for wisdom.

Problems have no respect of person. They attack everyone. The rich and the poor; the strong and the weak; the most affluent and the poorest of the land. Problems cause us to refocus our priorities. It causes us to take note on what is important. It is not what we have but who we are that is important.

As each of us deal with the Problem Factor, remember Genesis 50:20, when Joseph told his brothers that the evil meant against me, God used for good. Problems are used to fulfill God's purpose and plan for our lives. God's purpose for allowing problems in our life is to produce spiritual growth and maturity. So approach each day and each problem with this assurance: "The Lord will perfect that which concerned me: thy mercy, O Lord, endures forever" (Psalm 138:8) because Romans 8:28 reminds us that "... all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are called according to his purpose."

# SOUTH HOLLAND JETS GEAR UP FOR 49TH SEASON By Bob Bong

The South Holland Jets football and cheer program is one of the oldest continuously operating youth football programs in the south suburban area, having started in 1972.

League President Malik Jones says registration is now underway for the Jets' 49th season. "We are taking registration for the new season at shjets.org for both football and cheer," he says.

The Jets take in kids from ages 5 to 14. They play tackle football and the program starts with Mighty Mites and goes all the way up to Varsity. The league makes sure kids play with other kids of about the same size.

Jones says the new season will start a little later this year because the Jets joined a new league. "We are moving from the Will-Cook League to the Southwest Midget Football League, and they start their season a couple of weeks later than the Will-Cook League," he says.

The new 10-game season will start August 2 with the first practice, and the first game will take place on Saturday, August 28. Home games will again be played at Thornwood High School. "Mostly on Sundays," Jones says.

Jones says the Jets will play Dolton this year, the first time that has happened for the teams from the neighboring communities. For more information and to register, visit shjets.org.
