- ... that it is unlawful for anyone to engage in home solicitation sales within the village without first securing a license from the police department?
- ... that garbage or household waste must not accumulate in a resident's premises for more than seven days?
- ... if a fire hydrant is located on your property, we are requesting you please assume the responsibility of keeping the snow removed around it, so our Fire Department can readily locate it in the case of a fire.

### WHAT'S HAPPENING AROUND SOUTH HOLLAND



### STREETLIGHT PROJECT

Beginning in 2020, we began a project to gradually replace our streetlights with LED heads. We replaced 300 last year, and now we are pleased to announce that we will replace all remaining 821 streetlights by the end of the year, thanks to a grant from ComEd. The brightness and color of LED street-lighting do not degrade over time, so our streets will be consistently well-lit. Also, because of the high efficiency and long lifespan of LED lights, the Village will see a significant cost savings as a result of this project. Over 10 years, the savings is expected to be well above \$500,000.



### **NEW WAY TO PAY**

The Village is offering a new, user-friendly electronic payment system for water bill payments. With this system, you can schedule recurring payments, receive your bill via email, pay by text, and more. Visit southholland.org and click on Online Payments to get started.



### YARD WASTE PICKUP

The South Holland Public Works department would like to remind residents that Republic Services will stop picking up yard waste from their totes on November 30 through the winter months. Pickup will resume April 1. From December through March, the yard waste totes can be used for regular garbage.



### **SNOW ORDINANCE**

Please be aware of the Village's snow ordinance, which states that vehicles shall not be parked on any street if snow exceeds two inches or more. This helps us plow the streets effectively and efficiently. When shoveling snow in a driveway, we recommend depositing the snow to the right side (when facing the street) to minimize plows from blocking you in.



### **ADDING THE AREA CODE**

Residents with a 708 area code must now dial all 10 digits (the area code plus 7-digit telephone number) when placing phone calls, even when calling a local number. The change is part of a Federal Communications Commission effort to free up 988 as a three-digit method to call the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline.


# **FUN RUN 5K**

# AN OPEN LETTER TO OUR AIRST RESPONDERS

# Dear first responders—police officers, firefighters, and emergency personnel,

We thank God for you this Thanksgiving and Christmas season. Most of us have no clue just how much you do to serve and protect us. We're free to go about our daily business because you go about yours. As we hit the pillow at night, you hit the streets.

You've flown by us in your police cruisers, firetrucks and ambulances, lights flashing, sirens wailing, horns blaring. We pause to glance out our windows or pull over until you've passed by. We then carry on with our business, without another thought to where you're headed in such a hurry.

Now and then, the disturbing realities you routinely deal with get our attention. Sometimes, we call on you for help. But so often we're oblivious to these realities because you are out there, addressing them for us.

How often do you not know what you will find on the other end of a call? How often do you not know what awaits you around the corner? Still, you race in because that's what you signed up to do.

Led by Chiefs Staples and Kolosh, you prioritize community outreach. You work hard to build bridges of trust with residents. You show up at community events and interact with courtesy, friendliness and respect.






There is much you don't burden us with such as, what's it like to do your job when you're having a bad day? Or week? Or year? How do you handle the trauma that inevitably broadsides you? Where do you go for support? We may not know the answers to these questions, but we can keep these things in mind as we pray for you.

The work you do reminds me of a verb in the Bible that describes how God shows up for his people. English Bibles often translate this verb as 'visit.' But that doesn't quite do it justice. This verb describes the way God shows up in response to a 911 call to assess the need and then address it. In fact, Zechariah, father of John the Baptist, used this verb to describe how God was about to show up in Jesus that first Christmas to deliver his people: "Blessed by the Lord God of Israel, for he has visited and redeemed his people" (Luke 1:68, ESV).

Thank you, first responders!

# TEACHER BRINGS MUSIC EDUCATION AND APPRECIATION TO SOUTH HOLLAND COMMUNITY

Allen Kern is extremely passionate about what he does for a living and he works to ignite the same passion within his students at the Senses to Soul School of Music, which opened in South Holland in October 2018.

Born into a talented family of church singers and musicians, Kern began playing saxophone in 7th grade when his parents enrolled him in private lessons because there was no music program in his school. He joined his high school concert band and competed in city and state solo and ensemble competitions, then continued his private studies through high school and college. Kern later earned his Bachelors of Performing Arts/Music Education and Music K-12 Illinois State Certification

Kern's music career began in the Chicago Public Schools where he was a band director, choral director and





general music teacher in both elementary and high schools. He's now been a music educator for more than 20 years.

"I was very happy working as a music educator in Chicago Public Schools. I loved working with my students. They worked hard as they learned to work together. They became leaders," Kern says.

His teaching extended beyond the classroom as he travelled with students both locally and around the country competing and performing. "We gave them experiences outside of their own communities," he says. "Unfortunately, The Chicago Board of Education, like many school districts in our country, began to defund their schools' music programs. It became difficult to get instruments and teaching resources for my students. Frankly, I became frustrated, because I was no longer able to provide robust musical and educational experiences to my students."

Several years ago, Kern had an opportunity to partner with a fellow music educator to develop a community music program through Illinois State Representative Monique Davis's office. "Since the schools were taking music from the classrooms, our mission was to take music to the community. For about five years, we offered free vocal, percussion, woodwind and brasswind lessons to children and adults in the community," Kern says. "We would meet with our students after work. When Representative Davis retired we had to discontinue the music program. When I informed my students of the discontinuance, a few of them asked me to continue their lessons from my home. I taught from my home in the evenings for a few years until I was able to establish my music school full time in 2018."

Senses to Soul offers instrumental and vocal instruction to both kids and adults alike. Kern is grateful to the Village of South Holland and South Holland Business Association for their help in getting his business established and connecting him to volunteer opportunities.



"I've personally experienced and have seen firsthand the positive impact that music has on the development of people, particularly children," Kern says. "Not only are there cognitive, emotional, academic and social benefits of music, but music creates opportunities in so many areas. I've sent dozens of students to colleges on scholarships yearly, and discussed various career choices in the music industry. I have former students who are playing professionally, managing artists, in law, in promotions, in engineering and have other careers in music."

In addition to music instruction, the mission of the Senses To Soul School of Music includes supporting local bands. "We offer rehearsal space to local bands, we rent our studio space out to bands to livestream and host their own small concerts. We also host small concerts for local bands. Lastly, we offer very affordable high-quality full-service audio production for local bands," Kern says. "We just finished a jazz series. We partnered with the Southside Jazz Coalition, the Jazz Institute of Chicago and the Southside Music Alliance to bring world class local jazz musicians to the South Holland community."

Kern adds, "I am grateful that we are able to make local bands accessible to our community because it allows young people and families to enjoy live music without having to travel far, go to a bar or stay out late at night."

# CARVING AWAY

### SOUTH HOLLAND GROUP TEACHES THE ART OF WOODCARVING

Artists with a penchant for woodcarving or woodturning might be right at home with a group that is one of South Holland's best-kept secrets.

The South Suburban Chiselers-Illiana Woodturners is a nonprofit organization that has been in South Holland since 1976, located at 163rd and Vincennes Avenue. Led by their president, Tom Waicekauskas, the South Suburban Chiselers-Illiana Woodturners offer personal instruction and hands-on training for members in the art of wood carving, woodturning, and other related techniques. The group gives members the supplies and resources they need to complete any project, including









all wood, machinery, teachings and more. "I don't want people to think it costs a lot of money to participate," says Tom Waicekauskas. "We have all the resources available for them."

All kinds of people are welcome within the group. The 50 to 60 men and women who are currently members are artists, retired teachers, and computer programmers, to name a few. Several members' pieces were featured in the 2021 South Holland Artists' Gallery in October.

To join the group, anyone interested must simply fill out an application and provide a \$75 annual fee. With that, members get access to the workshop, supplies and resources. After joining, there is an introduction period where experienced members of the group watch new members turn or carve a small bowl safely and correctly. This









can be completed in one day or several, based on how comfortable a new member feels. "You take it at your own speed," Waicekauskas says. "It's not a race."

Tom Waicekauskas has been a member of the group since 1986 and now is their current president. Helping connect the group to other chapters and the American Association of Woodturners (AAW), Waicekauskas hopes to bring in more members and teach them about woodturning, carving and burning. He says that in his 35 years as a member, he has learned a lot of valuable skills and met a lot of outstanding people. He appreciates the fact that members are so willing to generously share their experience. He has hopes that the younger generation would join in order to keep the group thriving and spread more knowledge about the hobby to the public. "My goal" Waicekauskas says, "is to see it pass on to the new generations to come."

### **TO VISIT**

The group's campus at 16236 Vincennes Ave is home of the Midwest School of Woodcarving and the Midwest Carving Museum, where one can view hundreds of items carved and turned by club members over the last 50 years.
